## Bill to Watch

<u>HR 6560</u> – The Children's Program of All-Inclusive Coordinated Care (ChiPACC) would require provision of a full range of medical services to families with children who have life-limiting illnesses and who qualify for Medicaid. Currently there are gaps in Medicaid coverage for hospice and palliative services. Introduced July 26.

# Overcoming Payment Challenges to Realize the Promise of Telehealth

Inconsistent public and private insurance coverage and other challenges have hindered implementation of telehealth, one of the most promising tools to enhance access to care for children and youth with complex conditions. The National Academy for State Health Policy's (NASHP) Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Workgroup explored how telehealth services can be effectively deployed, and outlines what new state policies and funding are needed to implement it. ## Healthy Tomorrow Grants Available

Applications for funding are being accepted for the Healthy Tomorrows Partnership for Children Program, a cooperative agreement between the federal Maternal and Child Health Bureau and the American Academy of Pediatrics. Federal grants of up to \$50,000 per year for up to five years are awarded to support community-based child health projects that increase access to health services. Funds support projects that provide clinical or public health services, and do not support research. **Applications are due October 1**. Read more and apply.
