The highest percentage of hospitalizations in 2017 among California youth ages 0-17 was for mental health reasons. Mental diseases and disorders accounted for 14% of hospitalizations, almost twice the rate due to asthma/bronchitis. The rate of hospitalization due to mental health issues has been on the rise since 2008, according to kidsdata.org.
