New Director Appointed to Lead Department of Health Care Services Michelle Baass, who has been the California Health and Human Services Agency Undersecretary since 2018, has been appointed director of the California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS), effective September 15. DHCS oversees the California Children's Services Program, Medi-Cal, and other agencies of vital importance to children with special health care needs and their families.
