Transition to Adult Care Options for Improving Transition for Youth

The vast majority of youth with and without special health care needs do not receive the necessary services to transition from pediatric to adult care. Without adequate support during this transition, they face an increased risk of adverse outcomes. A 2020 issue brief from Child Trends examines the most recently available data on children and youth with special health care needs and their families. Findings indicate that, compared to their peers without special health care needs, CSHCN are more likely to experience circumstances that pose challenges to their well-being in economic, academic, and social-

emotional domains, in addition to health. Racial and ethnic disparities in access to opportunities and supports exacerbate inequities that CSHCN and their families experience, the study reports. Read the issue brief.
