CHILDREN WITH MEDICAL COMPLEXITY

Now Available for Use: PediHome – A Family-Reported Measure of Pediatric Home Healthcare Quality

PediHome is a content-valid family-reported survey measure of home healthcare quality for children with medical complexity that can be used to evaluate family caregivers' perspectives on to what degree their child is receiving accessible, high-quality home healthcare. The freely available survey, whose development was funded by our Foundation, can be used for care delivery evaluation, research, quality improvement, and identifying deficits in care to improve training. The survey is available in several formats, including REDcap, Qualtrics, and paper versions, in English and Spanish.

COVID-19 UPDATES

Maintaining Children's Health Coverage as New Law Brings Changes

A new federal law, the Consolidated Appropriations Act 2023, has wide-ranging and important effects on policies relating to CYSHCN, including Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program. A <u>blog</u> from the Georgetown Center for Children and Families explains key provisions, including the date for the ending of the Medicaid continuous coverage requirement and the phasing out of the flexible Public Health Emergency policies. <u>Information</u> is available to help organizations and families take the steps necessary to maintain children's health insurance after the continuous coverage requirement ends. Also, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services is offering a series of webinars, beginning January 25, on <u>Medicaid and CHIP</u> <u>Continuous Enrollment Unwinding: What to Know and How to Prepare</u>.

Related: California has established a <u>Coverage Ambassador Program</u> to develop trusted messengers from diverse organizations to inform beneficiaries, in culturally and linguistically appropriate ways, about how to maintain coverage.
