New Grants Focus on Dental Care, Medical Device Training for Non-English Speakers, Diversity of Hospital Advisory Councils

Grants recently awarded by our Foundation aim to address health care inequities for CYSHCN in three significant areas. A first-ever comprehensive, national study of the oral health needs of CYSHCN will document disparities that exist in their access to dental care. The second grant will identify barriers to providing education in languages other than English on the use of life-saving medical devices, and will assess whether caregivers feel prepared to use these devices. The third grant will build on previous work to assist hospitals in ensuring that the membership of Patient and Family Advisory Councils reflects the diversity of patient populations. TRANSITION TO ADULT LIFE

New Tool Helps Youth, Families, Providers Navigate Health Care Transition

Empowering young people and their families to take the lead in health care transition is the goal of a new website from the national Center for Transition to Adult Health Care for Youth with Disabilities. The site, developed for and by youth with intellectual and developmental disabilities, includes tools and resources for youth and their families, along with resources for health care professionals. Paying Family Caregivers: State Options, Limitations, and Policy Considerations

Despite the growing popularity of paying family members to provide care, many states are reluctant to authorize payment, citing a variety of reasons. A new issue brief from the National Health Law Program summarizes the various considerations that states must address to expand policy options for compensating family members. Read the issue brief.

Hearing Coming Up in Lawsuit Over State's Failure to Provide In-Home Services for Children with Complex Medical Needs

In a case originally filed 10 years ago against the state of Florida, a district court concluded in July that the state's failure to provide required in-home services contributes to unnecessary institutionalization of children with complex medical needs, and places many other children at serious risk of being unable to remain in their homes. The state was ordered to implement policy modifications, but immediately appealed. An issue brief from the National Health Law Program explains the case history and the implications of an upcoming January hearing on the appeal in the Eleventh Circuit Court. Read the issue brief.

Organizers are soliciting proposals for workshops based on the principles of the <u>Blueprint for Change</u>, the national framework for a system of services for children and youth with special health care needs. NATIONAL POLICY

Advocates Urge Opposition to Proposed Changes to Census Bureau Definition of Disability

A proposal from the U.S. Census Bureau to <u>change the questions about disability</u> in the American Community Survey could result in a dramatic drop in the number of individuals defined as disabled, potentially reducing funding for services and affecting civil rights

enforcement. Advocates are urging stakeholders to <u>read the proposed changes and leave a comment</u> for the Census Bureau by **December 19**.
